



Calvin G. McIntyre, 91 of Twin Falls, died June 6, 2013, at Bridgeview Estates, Twin Falls, after a long illness following a stroke.

Cal was born April 20, 1922, in Jerome, Idaho, to Calvin Alfred and Adelaide Smith McIntyre. His mother died when he was six years old. In school, Calvin enjoyed playing the trombone and was selected to play in the National High School Orchestra in Los Angeles. He graduated from Jerome High School in 1940.

He attended Monmouth College in Monmouth, IL. He enlisted in the Army Air Corps during World War II, where he was stationed in the U.S. Guam and Saipan. Cal played the trombone in college and in the Army. He married Betty Keller on June 6, 1947 and they had three children. They were later divorced. Cal graduated with a law degree from the University of Idaho in 1948, first in his class.

After graduating from law school and admission to the bar, Cal was employed by the Kansas City, Mo., law firm of Stinson, Magg, McElfresh & Fresell for one year. He then returned to

Idaho and joined the Twin Falls firm of Parry, Keenan, Robertson and Daly. Following the death of his father in 1951 Cal practiced law in Jerome and Hailey and served as an insurance adjuster for State Farm Mutual Insurance Company.

In October, 1957 he rejoined Parry, Robertson and Daly, where he practiced until 1979 when he, Bert Larsen and John Coleman established the firm of Larsen, McIntyre and Coleman. At the time of his retirement in 1987, he was a partner of the firm Coleman, McIntyre, Ritchie and Robertson. He was licensed to practice law for 63 years.

In 1982 he married Lillian Tegan Shaff, whom he met on a boat in Alaska. He had a life-long love of music and he and Lillian attended the Sun Valley Jazz festival for many years. Cal was a lifelong member of the First Presbyterian Church in Twin Falls, where he served as an Elder and in many other capacities. He was a world traveler and visited Thailand with his wife, Lillian at the age of 79.

He is survived by his wife of 31 years, Lillian McIntyre; his daughter Mary McIntyre of Duval, Wash.; a son David McIntyre of Louisville, Colo.; five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his son, Duncan McIntyre.
