Every lawyer has a professional responsibility to provide legal services to those unable to pay. A lawyer should aspire to render at least (50) hours of pro bono publico legal services per year.

IRPC Rule 6.1

- In fulfilling this responsibility, the lawyer should:
- Provide a substantial majority of the (50) hours of legal services without fee or expectation of fee to:
- Persons of limited means or
- Charitable, religious, civic, community, governmental and educational organizations in matters that are designed primarily to address the needs of persons of limited means; and
- Provide any additional services through:
- Delivery of legal services at no fee or substantially reduced fee to individuals, groups or organizations seeking to secure or protect civil rights, civil liberties or public rights, or charitable, religious, civic, community, governmental and educational organizations in matters in furtherance of their organizational purposes;
- Delivery of legal services at a substantially reduced fee to persons of limited means; or
- Participation in activities for improving the law, the legal system or the legal profession

Top Myths of Pro Bono Work

Myth

- I don't have malpractice coverage for that.
- I have too many potential conflicts with potential clients to peform pro bono work.
- I lack the necessary expertise to perform the needed pro bono services.

Reality

- IVLP provides malpractice coverage for pro bono work done through IVLP.
- ISB recognizes limited representation under nonprofit limited legal services programs. See IRPC 6.5 and comments.
- IVLP offers free training to lawyers who pledge to take a case in that area.

Top Myths of Pro Bono Work

Myth

 I can't do pro bono work because I have a house counsel license and I can only represent the organization I work for.

Reality

- Idaho Bar Commission Rule 225 (House Counsel License), section (e) "A person licensed as a house counsel may perform pro bono services in association with an Approved Legal Assistance Organization approved by the Idaho Supreme Court."
- Legal Aid and IVLP are the approved legal assistance organizations in Idaho.
