Summary of Events: For its Fall 2017 Southern Idaho event, Love the Law! invited students to attend its first ever event at the Federal District Courthouse in Boise. The idea for the event first came as a result of requests from students, on past event evaluations, to have an event at the Federal Courthouse or in conjunction with the Federal Court. The goal was to provide the students with the ability observe a live Federal Court proceeding followed by panel discussions with Federal Court personnel including attorneys and officers with the Federal Probation and U.S. Marshall's Office.

The event began with a welcome and introduction to the Love the Law! program by Chair, Courtney Holthus, followed by an overview of what to expect in the Courtroom and a preview of the sentencing hearing by Amy Tate, Courtroom Deputy to the Honorable Candy W. Dale. Committee members then escorted the students to observe a sentencing hearing in the case *USA v. James Patrick Stell*, 1:17-cr-0068-BLW (Count 1: Unlawful Possession of a Firearm and Ammunition and Forfeiture Allegation). Afterwards, the students were escorted back to a meeting room in order to attend a hearing debrief and question and answer session with the following panel members: Judge Candy W. Dale, U.S. Magistrate Judge; Mark Ackley, Federal Defenders of Idaho; Aaron Lucoff, Assistant U.S. Attorney – Criminal Chief; and Ryan Lesmeister, U.S. Probation Officer.

While lunch was served, the students participated in a second panel discussion with Ryan Lesmeister and Nicole Albright, Supervisory Deputy U.S. Marshall. Both Mr. Lesmeister and Ms. Albright shared information regarding their background and respective career paths, answering questions about their education and chosen careers, and then shared some interesting stories from their positions with federal law enforcement. Students and chaperones then departed at approximately 1:30 PM.
